


# All About... Graffiti and Street Art



# What Is Street Art?

Street art is artwork that has been created in a public place. It might not be a permanent piece.



# Graffiti

Graffiti is one type of street art. This is often writing or pictures sprayed onto walls in public places.



When graffiti artists don't get permission to use a public space, their graffiti is illegal (against the law).

Some towns and cities have legal graffiti sites where artists can showcase their work.



# History of Graffiti

The first wall drawings appeared in caves thousands of years ago.




Modern graffiti started in the United States in the 1960s. By the late 1960s, it had reached New York. This new art form became very popular throughout the 1970s when artists began tagging buildings.

Soon after, underground trains could be seen covered in spray paint and became a popular place for 'taggers' to write.

# History of Graffiti

Tags were a way of gangs marking their territory. They worked in groups called 'crews'. New York art galleries starting buying graffiti art at the same time that the mayor of New York spoke out about how he was against it.

During the 1980s, many graffiti artists began using roofs or canvases for their art. Even today, the debate over whether graffiti is vandalism or art is still being discussed.



# Art Installations

Art installations are another example of street art. These are organised art exhibitions and they are not illegal.

This image shows the public art installation, Blood Swept Lands and Seas of Red, which commemorated the centenary of the outbreak of the First World War.



As part of the installation, 888,246 ceramic poppies were made - one to remember each British soldier killed in the war.

# Stencil Art

Another example of street art is stencil graffiti. A stencil is a piece of paper, metal or plastic which has a design, pattern or words cut out of it. The artist rests it up against the surface and fills it in with paint, before removing it.

# Banksy

A lot of Banksy's work is done using stencils. Banksy is very famous but nobody knows his true identity, as he keeps it a secret.

# Keith Haring

Another famous street artist was Keith Haring. He was well known for his bold and bright street art and sculptures. His work has a cartoon-like style.



During the 1980s, he showcased his art in France, Australia and Germany, where he painted part of the Berlin Wall.

The Berlin Wall was built to separate East and West Germany. The majority of the wall was knocked down in 1989 so that it no longer functioned as a barrier. Some sections of the wall still stand and can be visited today.




# Maya Hayuk

# Tag

A tag is the most basic type of graffiti - it's the artist's signature. It's usually written in spray paint or marker pen.
